The morning session runs from 9:30 – 11:30 AM, and the afternoon session runs from 12:30 – 2:30 PM. We offer a supervised lunch hour for an additional fee for those students participating in both the morning and afternoon session. #### OWjL Camp Registrations Available

Ohio Wesleyan University and The Junior League of Columbus will once again be presenting its long-running summer program of challenge and enrichment for Central Ohio's **Gifted Middle School** students. Their program is called OWjL and is a week-long residential summer camp for gifted and talented students **currently** in the 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> grades. The program is held in June on the campus of Ohio Wesleyan University in Delaware, Ohio. Students enjoy a

wide range of academically challenging classes in the arts and sciences from nearly 70 courses.

Camp Dates are:

June 9-14, 2019 – 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> Grades June 16 - 21, 2019 – 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Grades June 23 – June 28, 2019 – 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> Grades To qualify, students must meet the state definition of giftedness by scoring in at least the 95<sup>th</sup> percentile on standard measures of achievement/ability or otherwise demonstrate talent or creativity. Contact our Gifted Services office at 450-6056 if you need the School Form filled out for your child, however, please allow 48 hours response time for submission of that form. Tuition for the 2019 camp is \$675 with full and partial scholarships available, based on need.

Do not fax applications. Late applications will be put on a wait list. Students who are selected will be notified after mid-March. Space is limited. #### 2019 THINK Summer Institute - Applications Available

The Davidson Institute is seeking **profoundly** gifted students, ages 13 to 16, who are interested in attending the 2019 THINK Summer Institute. THINK is a three-week residential summer program on the campus of the University of Nevada, Reno where students can earn six college credits by completing two university courses.

The 2019 THINK Summer Institute will run from July 13 through August 3, 2019. Tuition is \$3,950 and covers course credits, room and board and the cost of planned programs and activities. Need-based scholarships are available.

To be considered for the program, a student must:

- Be 13 to 16 years of age during the program dates
- Be a US citizen or permanent US resident living in US
- Submit a SAT or ACT score
- Receive one positive nomination as specified in the application
- Commit to being a full-time student during the program, which does not allow absences

Applications are considered on a first-come, first-served basis. Due to the intense nature of the program, enrollment is limited. Homeschooled students are eligible to apply. #### Scholarship Opportunities for Summer Programs

There are many enriching summer opportunities available to the gifted students of Central Ohio. This issue has just highlighted a few of the many available. Most summer

programs come at a cost to families, and therefore, may not be possible for some students to participate. Both Support for Talented Students (STS) and the Ohio Association for Gifted Children (OAGC) provide this need-based financial support for families of gifted identified students.

Support for Talented Students, a local non-profit organization whose purpose is to provide the opportunity for gifted students to participate in such activities that families may not otherwise be able to afford, is accepting applications for scholarships now through **March 10**<sup>th</sup>. We want to express our sincerest thanks to those who have volunteered to serve as a team appraiser on the day of the tournament. While this is a fun day for our appraisers, it can also be a long day for them as they are there from start to finish at the tournament. So we are most appreciative of the time they are giving.

#### Visual and Performing Arts Gifted Identification

Under Ohio Revised Code 3324 we are mandated to identify students as gifted in the area of the visual and performing arts. We are currently accepting referrals for students in this area which includes the visual arts, music, dance, and theatre. While there is a mandate for gifted identification in

the area of the arts, there is no mandate for gifted services in this area.

Students who are referred for evaluation in this area of gifted identification, will be evaluated using one to three different instruments. The first phase of the evaluation is the completion of a state approved checklist of gifted traits in the arts. An arts educator who is familiar with your child and the area in which he/she is being assessed will complete the checklist based on observations from the beginning of the school year.

Students who meet the state screening score, but not the state qualifying score, will be assessed with a second checklist. Students who earn a qualifying score on either checklist assessment will be invited to participate in the second phase of assessment. This phase is a display of talent using a portfolio of visual art or an original music, dance, or drama performance coupled with a display of requested technical skills as appropriate to the area being assessed. ### Advanced Placement Exam Registration - Due Friday, March 8, 2019

Advanced Placement exams will take place Monday, May 6 through Friday, May 17. Students will register for exams through their My Payments

Plus accounts. Cost for each exam is \$100 unless a student is on free/reduced lunch. Due to College Board deadlines and spring break, registration on My



Payments Plus will not be available after March 8<sup>th</sup>, so please plan accordingly and get registered as soon as possible.


The deadline to submit applications to the College Board for **special accommodations** is **February 22<sup>nd</sup>**. You must contact the guidance department at your child's school about the process to request special accommodations if your child's disability impacts his/her participation in standardized testing. The College Board Services for Students with Disabilities approve the requests **NOT** Worthington Schools. All accommodations must be approved through College Board before they can be provided.

Last year a total of 942 exams were administered in Worthington with 77.2% of those exams resulting in a score of 3 or higher.

## Gifted Overexcitabilities Presentation: January 10<sup>th</sup>, 6:30 PM, Worthington Education Center, 200 E. Wilson Bridge Road

Gifted children can be complex and intense due to overexcitabilities, or heightened sensitivities to the world around them. In this session we will unpack the overexcitabilities a student and family might face and the skills required to turn a struggle into a success for the gifted learner.

The session is presented by Dr. Colleen Boyle, an educator of gifted children for more than 20 years and currently coordinates gifted services for a Central Ohio district. Her educational background includes gifted education and educational administration with doctoral work in clinical, school, and educational psychology. Her research interests are the assessment of gifted children and social-emotional development of gifted learners.

# Parent Transition Nights Scheduled to Assist Parents with Planning for Next Year

This winter the Gifted Services Department is sponsoring two parent transition nights that will assist parents and their children with plans for the 2019-2020 school year. On **Thursday, January 17<sup>th</sup>, 6:30 PM**, we will host parents of 8<sup>th</sup> grade students who will be going to high school next fall, and on **Tuesday, January 22<sup>nd</sup>, 6:30 PM**, we will host parents of 6<sup>th</sup> grade students who will be going to middle school next fall. Both transition nights will be held at the Worthington Education Center.

These transition nights provide an opportunity for parents to hear from various faculty members at the middle and high school levels regarding the social and emotional needs of the gifted adolescent and appropriate coursework and opportunities for gifted learners at each level. A representative will speak about the middle school math program which is not part of the Gifted Services program. These transition nights provide a smaller environment for parents to have dialogue about advanced learner issues before the formal scheduling process begins for students.
